Why facemasks are more effective than visors.

As you all know due to Covid-19 everybody must wear a face covering in schools, shops and on public transport. But many people choose the face visor or face shield because they're easier to breath in, but are they as effective?


Researchers from the Israel Institute for biological research have found that face shields do not fully protect you. This is because of the fact that they aren't fully covering your mouth. The sides and bottom of the visor are open. This makes it easier for the micro droplets that we release to enter other's bodies. These micro droplets are released whenever we speak or breathe. Though wearing a mask provides considerably more protection.



These researchers say that the only people that should wear visors are those with a respiratory condition or any form of special needs that might make the person uncomfortable while wearing a mask. They say that the most effective way to wear a visor is to also have a mask underneath it.

Though many people will argue that visors give more protection by covering the eyes and reducing risks of people touching their face, the visors have been shown that the micro droplets can enter through the sides and bottom of the visor. The HSE has said "If you find it difficult to wear a cloth face covering, it's okay to wear a full face visor or face shield instead. They are not as good as wearing a face covering, but you'll still get some level of protection," this statement further proves my point as the HSE themselves said visors offer less protection.

guide us.


Academy of Code



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



How Climate Change is Affecting Polar bears

Many of us already have heard about Climate Change and how it affects the Earth. But I think people fail to understand the true effect of it on animals. As an example I will be talking about the polar bears, explaining how you contribute to their declining numbers and how you can help.

Polar bears heavily rely on sea ice environments for their traveling, hunting, mating, resting, and in some areas, maternal dens. But due to the increase in temperature, the ice has been melting at a rate of 14% since 1970. The Arctic has shrunk to 3.74 million square kilometres, compared to its 7 million square kilometres. Their numbers have declined to only 30,000 and are still decreasing.

You can unknowingly contribute by eating meat due to the fact that cows produce methane from waste. Methane is about 23 times more potent than carbon dioxide. Through use of fossil fuels and deforestation we have increased the amount of carbon dioxide by 47% since the industrial revolution. Each year we produce 40 billion tonnes of carbon dioxide and 11.6 trillion tonnes of trash.

Polar bears will not be the only ones that will be affected by the Arctic melting, humans will be too. This is due to the rising sea levels of the ocean that could cause deadly floods in countries. These could harm people and cause massive amounts of destruction to infrastructure, cities, buildings and homes.

You can help mitigate these effects by recycling, taking public transport and cycling to work. Donating to a charity like polarbears international.org will help the polar bears adapt to their environment. Making these small changes to our daily lives does really help and only if the whole world works together can a sustainable goal can be achieved.

In November of 1786 all the children who had betrayed the witch disappeared. The town started to search for the children who had disappeared but they were never




seen again. The people were terrified and decided to abandon their homes and find new homes far from this evil place.





This is the story of the Blair Witch and how she avenged her death.









School Survey



A small sample of students from the school were asked to fill out a short survey concerning their carbon footprint and similar questions. These are their results.






Do you properly use the recycling bins provided around the school?

On sunny days it is great to see our teachers use the outdoor space. Teachers for various subjects will often have class outside and can social distance safety while continuing their class. .




Jonathan Sharkey from the Leinster rugby has been assisting with our future sports coaches and teaching them about the principles of coaching.

Some use drugs and think they're flying.


Mental illness, broken homes, bogey bankers

Chess

Chess is a well known strategic game, but for those of you who don't know how to play but are interested, these 3 challenges will show some of the different chess pieces. To win you must force the enemy into a position where he can't move without losing his king, a checkmate. You too must protect your own king but in these challenges you wont need to worry about that. You can play on your own for these challenges, but it's better to have a friend act as the enemy for better results. To move a piece, first write its coordinates then the coordinates you want to move it to.

For instance, if i wanted to move a pawn on E2 one space forward it would be written as: PE2-PE3. The first letter of the piece is used to tell which piece is moving. To win these challenges, use the given amount of moves to get a checkmate. Good luck.

Sudoku

Sudoku is a number game where you must fill in the given boxes using the numbers already given. You use the given numbers to determine which numbers go into the empty boxes. The rules are as follows.

Rule 1: No number can be repeated in any of the 3 by 3 squares.

Rule 2: Only one number can go in each box.

Rule 3: No number can be repeated along the horizontal or vertical lines from that box.

Rule 4: To win, you must fill all boxes correctly.

There are a total of 3 different Sudoku challenges, increasing in the difficulty. The third one however, is special. It is known as chess Sudoku, and has added rules to make it more difficult. The rules are as follows.


1: Normal Sudoku rules apply.

- 2: No number can be within a knight's move (chess) from the same number. Knight's rule.
- 3: No number can be within a king's move from the same number. King's rule
- 4: No number can have the previous or continuous number horizontally or vertically within one box. Consecutive rule.


Best of luck to Sudoku fans, this will take some time.



Puzzles and Problems



No.1: Double rook checkmate in 3 moves Rooks can move as far as possible without hitting an enemy or the end of the board vertically or horizontally. They can take pieces if they can move there. Kings can move 1 space in any direction, and can take enemy pieces if they are in range.



No.2: queen and king checkmate in 3 moves.

Queens can move in any direction as far as they can without taking a piece, meaning vertically, diagonally, or horizontally. They can take pieces anywhere they can move.



No.3: Halley's comet endgame checkmate in 4 moves

This challenge is hard. The Halley's comet endgame typically takes about 60 moves, but this challenge only involves the last 4 moves so you can learn about the knight. The knight moves in an L shape. It can move 3 spaces up, down, left or right and then 2 spaces left or right. Alternatively, it can move 2 spaces up, down, left or right and 3 spaces to the left or right. It can take a piece if it can move there. A unique feature of the knight is that it can jump over pieces, meaning even if a piece blocks its route, it can still get to its destination. The pawn can only move 1 space forward, and can only take enemy pieces 1 space diagonally, still forward. Meaning the pawn is harmless so long as you don't move to f or d4.



Staff Interview New Timetable

With the restrictions in place to help stop the spread of covid-19, this year's timetable has drastically changed. Last year, we had a total of 9 classes that lasted 40 minutes with 2 breaks; A 15 minute break after the first 3 classes and a 45 minute lunch after the second 3. This year we now have 6 hour long classes with a half hour lunch after the first 3 classes. I wanted to find out how teachers were affected by the new timetable, so I asked 3 teachers for their opinions, Mr Chambers, Ms O'Donnell and Mr Boyd. They were all asked the same questions as to get a mixed response.

First interview: Ms O'Donnell.

J: Do you like the new timetable?

"No, I find it hard to go get a drink of water or get a bit of fresh air."

J: Do you lose any free classes?

"No, the amount of time I teach for is still the same."

J: Do you like not having a break?

"No, 3 classes in a row gets a little taxing."

J: Do you like having a shorter lunch?

"I think it's fine because 30 minutes is plenty of time."

J: Is teaching 3 classes in a row hard with a mask?

"It was at first but I've gotten used to it."

J: Do you think we have enough restrictions with this new timetable? And do you think they are effective?

"I think we don't need any more restrictions on the timetable, and in my opinion it's working, seeing as the virus didn't spread even when there were cases in the school, but the restrictions don't allow group activities, which I miss."

Interview 2: Mr Chambers.

J: Do you like the new timetable?

"Yes and no, as while I see it as necessary, it does get a little repetitive after a while."

J: Do you lose any free classes?

"Yes, since there are less classes, I don't get as many free classes this year; The amount of time remains the same though."

J: Do you like not having a break?

"Yes, it doesn't really make a difference in time."

J: Do you like having a shorter lunch?

"Yes, because you still have enough time to get lunch and go outside for some fresh air, while lowering the risk of spreading the virus."

J: Is teaching 3 classes in a row hard with a mask?

"It's fine for me, because I've gotten used to it."

J: Do you think we have enough restrictions with this new timetable? And do you think they are effective?

"I think we're fine as is, and it does seem to be working with everyone's help."



Interview 3: Mr Boyd.

J: Do you like the new timetable?

"I love it, especially the 58 minute classes because it gives me more time to complete work in class; I can teach something and still have enough time for the students to practice."

J: Do you lose any free classes?

"The amount of time i get off is still the same, and I prefer it because I can get more done in an hour rather than 40 minutes."

J: Do you like not having a break?

"It's fine, because i normally worked through the break so it doesn't make a difference for me."

J: Do you like having a shorter lunch?

"I have no problem with sacrificing 15 minutes for safety reasons, plus it means we finish earlier."

J: Is teaching 3 classes in a row hard with a mask?

"It was hard at first, because the mask strings would hurt my ears, but I've gotten used to it and I'm not bothered by it anymore."

J: Do you think we have enough restrictions with this new timetable? And do you think they are effective?

"We have enough restrictions, the new finishing time is pretty good and i don't think we can really put too many more restrictions on the timetable. Plus people seem to have adapted to the new timetable."

From what I learned from the teachers, it seems the timetable was only hard for the first 1-2 weeks, and people seem to have gotten used to everything, while still finishing 40 minutes early.

Movie Review: The Green Mile

A rundown

The Green Mile is a movie released in 1999, adopted from Stephen King's novel under the same name. Directed by Frank Darabont, known for many of his popular works such as The Shawshank Redemption, The Walking Dead and script work on A Nightmare on Elm Street 3.

The film itself grossed at about \$286 million from a \$60 million budget. Also being nominated for four Academy Awards: Best Picture, Best Supporting Actor for Duncan, Best Sound and Best Adapted Screenplay.





A summary

The Green Mile tells a tale from a time of mass prejudice and discrimination in 1935 America. Which is a very topical subject in today's world. We find ourselves in the Cold Mountain Penitentiary, a prison in Louisiana. Specifically the death row ward, where the prisoners are subject to death by electric chair.

We follow the perspective of Paul Edgecomb, played by Tom Hanks. A warden at the prison in charge of the death row ward, aptly named The Green Mile. The ward is turned on its head as a pleading innocent man is sent to death for the rape and murder of a young girl. A coloured man by the name of John Coffey bears the burden of his inevitable death, all the while he suffers from a discriminatory judicial system.



The review

Darabont's directive talent is well shown as he beautifully lays out the tragic story of The Green Mile with his ability to portray the deep and interesting characters of 1935's deep south. Our protagonist, Paul Edgecomb, differs greatly from his peers at the ward. Not in any way that makes his colleagues seem unlikable, but his view of the world around him sees past the face value of the people who visit his ward. Allowing him to see the true good nature of characters, with an unclouded perception. Unlike many others in the depressing and cold world of The Green Mile. Making him not only an easy character to relate to, but one whose actions are justifiable.



Another great component of the story are the all the side characters and their contribution to build this picture of what living in this world would be like. A great character makes an amazing world. The Green Mile is a prime example of this. We are not given blank, face-value characters that the director forces you to love or hate. Of course, we are pushed into the notion that this or that character has bad intentions or is a saint, but all of their actions have a true motive to them. Instead of being some filler to make a "unique" character. To the point where we can even feel empathy for a certain character that was nothing but trouble for The Green Mile.

All in all, Darabont has shown that he has the ability to bring King's work of fiction to life in a manner that gives it the humour, emotion and character that would be worthy of a rewatch.



The Mandela Effect

What is the Mandela effect?

The Mandela effect is an effect that occurs when our mind remembers moments that have never existed. The psychologist and blogger Fiona Broome decided to coin it with this name precisely because of the widespread memory that Nelson Mandela had died in prison.

What is the cause?

Several explanations have been given for the phenomenon although there is broad consensus about the reason for this effect. All memories are periodically reconstructed throughout a person's life, and they are modified through both internal and external stimuli. References to a different memory (either through conversations with other individuals or through the media that propagate a wrong idea) modify one's experience and shape the original memories, all reinforced by confirmation biases and cognitive dissonances.
