

Most of the boys are involved in extracurricular activities and we have some wonderful athletes who have shown great talent, dedication and teamwork on the fields and courts of De La Salle College, Churchtown. Many of the boys have taken part in debate club and music club and this highlights their varied interests, hobbies and talents. Testament to their determination to make De La Salle College, Churchtown the best possible place, First Years secured three places on the Student Council and this bodes well for the future.

Another year brings with it another set of graduates. Despite the obstacles faced by students last year, be it remote learning, limited social contact, or exam anxiety, the class of 2021 met the challenge head-on.

Graduates excelled, with the majority of the year group receiving more than 400 points, with many attaining in excess of 500. Our two top students of 2021 achieved 611 points and 625 points, they were Cathal Kelly and Russel Flores respectively, both students are studying Science in UCD.

In DLSC we are committed to providing pathways to as many 3<sup>rd</sup> level options as possible and the class of 2021 have gone on to enrol in a variety of high-point courses, as well as PLCs and apprenticeships across differing fields. Of these recent graduates, many have reported that they are happy with their courses and are content with their progress into the next step of their academic and professional lives. Now studying a range of disciplines in a variety of institutions, De La Salle graduates have written to the school, expressing their thoughts on life after school and their reflections on their time spent here.

Enda Carberry, who now studies Geography & Sustainability in UCD, remembers the balance maintained between academic work, sporting activities, and personal relationships, explaining that "it was vital in making my experience at De La Salle as productive and enjoyable as it was."

Jack McDonnell was accepted into an FAI Player Development course commented on the Leadership opportunities afforded to him during his time in DLS "Being both a mentor and a prefect supplied me with many useful skills that I have since used many times after finishing school, skills I will continue to use and carry with me throughout my life".

Diarmuid Balfe, who is enrolled in UCD's Architecture course, wrote that he values the chances offered by the school for personal development. Having been a Mentor, Senior Rugby Captain, and Prefect, Diarmuid explained that these roles provided an opportunity to "develop leaderships skills that cannot be taught."

And Shamel Khan, who is now studying Biological and Biomedical Sciences in Trinity, noted that he valued the amicable atmosphere of the school, writing that it was not "just a learning hub, but a community of students and teachers working diligently, but also enjoying ourselves."


We congratulate all of the class of 2021 on their results and wish them well as they carry the De La Salle spirit with them in their future endeavours.


# Seomra Suaimhnis

# De La Salle College School App






The De La Salle College School

## Transition Year News

The first school term was a busy couple of months for Transition Years as they enjoyed their first block of modules including Cooking Gardening; C.S.I; Sustainability and Journalism. These give our students an opportunity to sample some fun & interesting new areas of study they would not normally have in other academic years and perhaps develop or spark a passion for a new hobby or career prospect later in life. This year Work Placement takes place every Friday, which has given the lads the chance to find part time jobs in a wide range of workplaces such as Construction. Barbershops. Retail corporate environments.

## Sports Coaching & Social Work

Outside the classroom, the lads set out on Tuesday afternoons to do their bit to give back to the community. Some students have been completing Sports а Coaching Programme prepare for going into primary schools to volunteer as coaches in sports like rugby & GAA. Jonathan Sharkey from Leinster Rugby delivered his Clue Programme with the lads to teach them about peer coaching.







Other students have been using their Tuesday afternoons Social Work by volunteering in charity shops including NCBI and Oxfam or assist those fortunate in their local community including elderly neighbours and family members or even helping younger students with this homework in the school homework club. This has been fantastic for teaching them the importance of giving back to society, especially in current times.





As TY is about broadening the student's awareness of the world and wider community one key topic we focused on in October was Autism awareness. The school welcomed Denis Sexton of the Irish Society for Autism to speak to the lads about the work he does and to provide them with some information about the condition. Building on this, the students also completed immersive AsIAm workshop, which educates them about what it is like living with Autism so they can better understand how people on the spectrum experience the world.



#### **Workshops & Guest Speakers**

The students began the term welcoming Gerry Cooney of the Ruland Centre who spoke to them about various forms of addiction that affect young people today including gaming, social media, drugs and alcohol and how best to deal with peer pressure in today's climate.

To develop stronger bonds between the TY groups, all students partook in the unique **Teamworks** team-building workshop, which saw students work together in their class groups to complete short sharp challenges in a fun, memorable way. This was a fantastic experience for all involved!



#### **Activities**

Thursday afternoons are all about getting out and about and active to develop a healthy body and mind. Students have been enjoying 4-week blocks of fitness-based activities.

Alan Martin from the Dublin School of **Judo** is giving the lads a taste of Judo, which incorporates a mix of basic Judo techniques to bring out their competitive side and teaching them the history of the Sport and Japanese culture.

Other students have been getting their heart rates up in **Boot Camp** with Rocky Fitness, where students complete a variety of cardio-based and strength-building exercises and short sport-based activities to encourage a more active lifestyle.



Students have also been having great fun developing their aquatic fitness with **Swimming** at Swan Leisure in Rathmines. This course teaches beginners the basics of swimming and more proficient swimmers the opportunity to get their swimming to the next level.

Aside from the set activities the lads completed two hikes this term to get some well needed fresh air and some bonding time with their peers and tutors Ms Plunkett, Ms Egan and Mr Brennan. The first was a start of year hike to Ticknock in September and then another to the Hellfire Club in October to mark the end of the term at Halloween.









#### **Green Schools News**



This year our Green schools committee are working towards their third flag! This year's focus is Water. The students have been working tirelessly to ensure our school is conserving water.

We are educating students about the importance of conserving water. We have installed a new water fountain and so far we have saved 12,345 plastic water bottles!







The committee researched and purchased Water Butts with the aim of collecting rainwater for use in the beautiful school garden, which was renovated by our TYs last year, and other areas such as the flowerbed that is planned next to our newly refurbished Arts Block.

Our Green Schools Committee have researched high quality reusable Water Bottles to improve sustainability and reduce single-use plastic that ends up littering our rivers and damaging the ecosystems in our oceans. The official school water bottles are available to purchase from Mr Brennan or via Easy Payments on our school website.

The specially-designed logo on the bottles represents the school's crest, the Water theme for green schools and the Plastic-free schools initiative with the fantastic motto "Be Plastic Free in DLSC!".





#### 1st place in Upcycling Competition



Sustainability is a new TY module this year in which students take action to make De La Salle College a more sustainable school. This involves completing projects in the school in order to make the school a more sustainable environment, but also educating the school population about how they can live more sustainably.

TY(S) took on two projects this year, one of which was to upcycle some school furniture. They undertook to upcycle the outdoor board games area which had been getting great use this year by students playing their favourite games. The group surveyed the 1st year students to find out their favourite board games, which were chess and checkers. They then sourced old classroom tables and stools that were not being used and planned how to upcycle them, with the helpof the woodwork teachers! After lots of sanding they painted the tops of the stoolsblack and white to match the chess boards and varnished the legs. They then used a cardboard template to spray paint the chess boards onto the tables. They also reused bottle caps and spray painted them black and white to form checkers pieces. They demonstrated great creativity and artistry to get this project completed.

They decided to enter their Upcycling Project in a competition which was being run by My Waste Ireland. The final was held on 23rd October, and we are delighted that De La Salle College came 1st in the schools category! The prize of €700 will be used to fund further Sustainability projects in the school, we can't wait to put it to good use. Congratulations to the TY students involved, in particular Pavel, Bilal, Jaden, Lee, Lathan and Samuel. Their contribution to making De La Salle more sustainable is highly commendable!

On October 13th 2021 our TY group received diffusion tubes from The Global Program organization.


The tubes are designed to capture a sample of the air over a short period of time. Our TY Sustainability class placed three tubes in strategic places around the school campus. The tubes were attached, using cable ties, 3 metres above ground level.

On the 10th of November 2021 the diffusion tubes were removed from their locations and sent to the Globe Program for analysis. We look forward to hearing back from them about the quality of our air here in Churchtown.



#### What is the Global program?

The Global Program is a worldwide hands-on, science and education program focusing on the environment. To make this project possible the global program worked with NASA to make the diffusion tubes so they can be easy to set up and be sent out all over the world.

On Tuesday October 5th we were delighted to once again host our Open Day. Having Covid protocols meant we were able to host the event in a safe environment.




