# Senior Cup Match vs Gormanston College

S.C.T. Match Report GORMANSTON COLLEGE 24 – 13 DE LA SALLE CHURCHTOWN

De La Salle College vs Gormanston College kicked off at 2pm on January 12th. The fixture was played on a crisp afternoon in Donnybrook. At the start of the match, this looked like anyone's game. Salle's left winger Fergus Balfe rewarded the hard work of his forwards, led by excellent captain Ryan McLoughlin-Heaphy, with two penalties to hold the scoreboard at 6-5 in favour of De La Salle in the 16th minute.

Gormanston College scrum-half Matthew Flanagan proved himself a danger and his first try came after a mistake at the De La Salle lineout, allowing the ball to fall to Gormanston second row Olamide Okusaga who broke away down the right wing and was tackled close to the try line by De La Salle's centre Daniel Slattery. De La Salle returned strong and got into a good position on the pitch but unfortunately for De La Salle the ball was recycled quickly and the next phase led to Daly's try. Lack of concentration from Salle led to centre Tom Downes finishing the scoring in the first half with a swerving run through the centre of De La Salle's backline to give his

side a 17-6 lead at the interval..

In the second half Centre Jack Mitchell showed a clean pair of heels accelerating over the try line to confirm Gormanston's dominance in the second half. His try was converted by in the 45th minute to give Gormanston a 24-6 lead.

Despite the attempts of Eoghan Hennessy and Adam Nealon to string backline moves together De La Salle could not get close to the try line. Although the introduction of Oussama Bouattoura, David Clarke and Carlos Carabias Bacenilla gave De La Salle a different dimension in the last 15 minutes. At long last Oussama Bouattoura finally scored De La Salle's first try. His low body angle and superior strength drove him over the line with Adam Nealon dropkicking over the conversion in the 68th minute but despite their efforts it was too late for Salle to come back.

De La Salle will not advance to the Junior Cup!



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
# **Glasnevin Cemetry Tour**
